## **Key Passage**

### **Content and Structure**

The <u>book of Esther</u> revolves around three movements in a storyline:

- I. Beginning (1:1–2:13)—Sets the stage for the narrative and includes the events that prepare the way for Esther's rise to queenship and Mordecai's service to the king.
- II. Middle (3:1–9:19) Contains the scheme to defeat Mordecai and the Jews and its subsequent defeat.
- III. End (9:20–10:3) Establishes Purim and incorporates an appendix about Mordecai.

The book of Daniel centers on two major sections:

- **I. Section 1**—Narratives of Daniel's life (1-6)
- II. Section 2—Daniel's visions (7-12)

# **Summary**

The book of Daniel is characterized by vivid symbolism and reflecting heroic historical events during the Babylonian exile of the Jewish people. Because Daniel is not an easy book to understand, its interpretation requires careful study and reflection. Daniel himself wrote, when reflecting on the meaning of one of his visions, "But I was appalled by the vision and did not understand it" (Dan. 8:27).

In the old Jewish division of the OT Daniel is part of the third section, called the Writings, along with such books as Psalms, Proverbs, and Job. It was not included in the second section of the OT, called the Prophets. Although portions of his book may be interpreted from a prophetic perspective, Daniel is never explicitly identified as a prophet.
